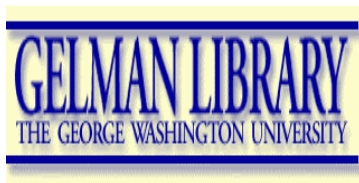

One user writes: *On occasion, a little yellow light bulb pops up on my screen when I am working in Word. What's up with that?*

When you see that little light bulb, Word has noticed that you may be having trouble using a specific feature, or going about it in a very convoluted way. If you click on the bulb, instructions will pop up, or it will suggest a few ideas that may interest you. The first time I saw the lightbulb, I was trying to squeeze some text into a textbox that was too small. It let me increase the size of the textbox with one click!

The lightbulb appears in other MS Office 2000 applications. Just this morning, I used one in PowerPoint. Of course, you don't *have* to use it. Clicking on OK will get rid of the suggestions and you can keep doing whatever you were doing.
