Benjamin, Rodney and David Cebon. *The Forgotten Zionist: the Life of Solomon (Sioma) Yankelevitch Jacobi*. Jerusalem: Gefen Publishing House, 2012. 161 pp. \$40.00. (9789652295712).

Jacobi (1897-1939) was a leader of Revisionist Zionism. Near the end of his life he was appointed by Ze'ev Jabotinsky, the leader of Revisionism, to head the nesiut (presidium) of the New Zionist Organization. The authors are, respectively, the son-in-law and grandson of Jacobi. Benjamin (who died shortly before the book was published) held a doctorate in history from the University of Melbourne. The style of the book is generally factual and the authors make good use of letters exchanged between Jacobi and Jabotinsky. That being said, it is not without errors. For example the bombing of the King David Hotel is attributed to Lehi when it was done by the Irgun. One could also wish for fuller and more consistent referencing. The book is often dry, especially in the first part that deals with Jacobi's fundraising on behalf of ORT and two other Jewish charities. The sections of the book on Jacobi's efforts on behalf of Revisionism and his jousting with other Zionists will be of interest to more people. Most fascinating of all is the part of the book concerned with Jacobi's untiring efforts in the desperate and difficult business of spiriting European Jews past the British and into the Land of Israel.
